## GENERAL RULES:

1. All exhibits must be removed between 3pm and 4pm the last day of Fair. Unclaimed exhibits will be held at the Fair Office. You must contact the Caretaker to pick up your item.
2. Open class premiums will be paid Sunday, 8/21/16 from noon to 4pm. Premiums not picked up on that day will be held in the Fair Office for pickup. If premiums are not picked up by August 31, 2016 the premium(s) will be forfeited back to the Wasco County Fair.
3. General supervision of the grounds and entire exhibition, police regulations and entrance gates, are vested in the Fair Board Directors.
4. The Fair Board reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters arising from the fair.
5. The superintendents shall be responsible to the Board for their respective departments and have the power to appoint necessary aides and assistants. Superintendents shall see that all articles on exhibition are carefully preserved and perform other duties as the Board may decide.
6. Entry clerk will be in the Open Class office next to the 4-H building from 8 am to 6 pm Wednesday, August 17th. All exhibits must be in place by 6:00pm Wednesday, August 17th. All animals, excluding horses, must be pre-entered by (see appropriate entry form in Fair Book). Static Exhibit Judging will start at 6 pm August 17, during which the buildings will be closed. No entry clerk will allow entry books to leave his or her possession, or to be inspected by anyone except clerks and other officials until entries are closed.
7. Livestock should have been in the possession of the exhibitor for at least 30 days prior to the fair.
8. FFA and 4-H exhibitors cannot, at the same time, exhibit the same animal or article in open class as exhibited in FFA and 4-H, with the exception of horses in the horse show Saturday.
9. Where there is only one exhibit in a class, the award will be made on merit, and premiums will not be awarded merely because there is no competition.
10. Premiums and ribbons will be given only for items listed. Other exhibits may be made for display only. Only one exhibit in each class per exhibitor unless otherwise noted.
11. Ribbons will be given to Adults and Children.
12. All claims against Fair for services, premiums or materials must be presented within 60 days of close of Fair.
13. Any exhibitor interfering in any way with the judges during judging will be disqualified from receiving any premiums.
14. Open class livestock exhibits requiring daily care will be issued a pass (if child is the exhibitor, then 2 passes will be issued) provided stall fees have been paid.
15. **All Open Class livestock must be pre-entered by July 19, 2016.** Mail completed entry form and fees to the Wasco County Fair c/o Vicki Sallee, 6855 Chenowith Rd. W., The Dalles, OR 97058.
16. Fees are as follows: Cattle over 60 months, hogs, goats and sheep, \$5.00 per pen. Horse stalls \$40.00 plus a \$25.00 deposit and may be secured in advance by contacting Horse Stall Superintendent.
17. Exhibitors must keep stalls, pens and aisles in neat condition at all times. All manure and waste must be placed in designated receptacles.
18. Fair Board forbids anyone taking any animal known to have contagious disease onto

the Fairgrounds. All breeding cattle over 60 months of age must have been tested for Bangs disease and tuberculosis and found free from reaction to either disease not more than 60 days prior to the opening of the Fair.

Individual health certificates must be presented to the cattle superintendent.

19. Wasco County is certified brucellosis free. The State of Oregon is certified tuberculosis free. Cattle originating in this area do not need to be tested.
20. No soliciting, asking for donations, selling raffles, or any such activities will be allowed on Fairgrounds, except with special permission.
21. All ground leases, space contracts, unless otherwise specified, will expire at the close of Fair and all booths, etc., and must be removed prior to Aug. 31.
22. Out-of-county exhibits accepted when space permits.
23. No ATVs – (Exception: Official use only – see fair manager or board member).
24. Helmets are required for all horse riders 18 and under.
25. No drug paraphernalia maybe sold at our fair.
26. No Drones maybe flown over the fairgrounds without certificate of insurance and board approval.

### **Exemption from liability:**

Every person who is subject to these Rules herewith, exempts and discharges the Fair Management, its agents and employees, from liability for any loss, damage or injury to himself or to his/her property, whether caused by said management, its agents, or employees or by any other cause.

Every exhibitor will be responsible for any injury that may be occasioned to any person or to the property of any person by any animal owned or exhibited by said exhibitor and shall indemnify the management against all claims for injury occasioned by any animal owned or exhibited by him or arising from the acts of negligence of any employee or such exhibitor.

### **Exhibitor information:**

1. All out of state animals will require a valid certificate of veterinary inspection with an Oregon permit number. Out-of-state animals without valid health and importation documentation will not be allowed to participate. Wasco County Fair staff will check entries for the required certificate and permit numbers.
2. Wasco County Fair has developed a protocol for reporting sick animals to the superintendents. Any animal showing to be ill should be treated appropriately, and if necessary removed from the fair and sent home.

## CATTLE: Department A

- Pre-registration and pen fee of \$5.00 per pen must be received by July 19, 2016. Late entries will be accepted if space permits.
- All entries must be in place by 2 pm Wednesday, August 17th.
- All general rules apply. Judging will be Friday following 4-H Beef Showmanship
- Any number of animals may be entered per class but premiums are limited to two per class. Only class winners are eligible for championship classes.
- Bulls must be shown with nose ring. Individual animals shown in following classes may be used to make up Get-of-Sire or Produce-of-Dam classes.
- **Premiums: 1st-\$8.00; 2nd-\$6.00; 3rd-\$4.00**

152 Bull, 18 months and under 2 years

- 164 Replacement Heifer, Wasco Co. herd produced. Replacement yearling heifers that have not yet calved, 12 to 24 months of age, all breeds. **Excludes 4-H & FFA entries.**

No entry which has an open classification will be allowed in "Any Other" classification.

- All exhibits must be picked up between 3:00 and 4:00 pm Sunday. The exhibit building will be closed after 5:00. Remaining floral entries will be discarded, and houseplants or personal belongings used in arrangements will be retrievable only via the office.
- Definitions are as follows:
  1. Bloom: a single blossom with self-foliage.
  2. Specimen: a single portion of a single plant.
  3. Spike: a stalk carrying one or many stem less or nearly stemless blossoms, without foliage or with minimal foliage.
  4. Spray: a stem with a number of flowers, with foliage.
- **Premiums are as follows: 1st -\$3; 2nd-\$2; 3rd-\$1.**

Helpful Hints:

1. Cut flowers early in the morning when they have had the benefit of the night's cooler air. Morning cut flowers have greater vigor.
2. Choose buds about to open and flowers just beginning to show pollen rather than older blossoms. Flower stems should be cut cleanly at an angle with a sharp knife or scissors. If stem grows with foliage attached, the exhibitor should retain enough to balance stem and flower/s. Plunge the cut flower stems into a clean container with tepid water. Remove any foliage below the water level. Groom carefully before exhibiting!
